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2025 Horse ID Update


The Kansas 4-H Horse ID Certificate (P1039) has been updated for the 2025 4-H program year. Beginning with the 2025 4-H program year, please use the new form and destroy previously used 4-H Horse ID Certificates. As a reminder, to properly identify your horse, complete the 4-H Horse ID Certificate, have your Extension Agent sign it and copy it. A COPY of the Horse ID Certificate is kept on file in the Extension Office and the 4-H Horse member maintains the ORIGINAL certificate. The original certificate is presented by the 4-H member to show staff for check-in at the local 4-H horse shows. Beginning in 2025, registration papers WILL NOT be accepted to identify horses for the 4-H Horse project. An example of the Horse ID Certificate is available online.

Additionally, the 4-H Horse Show Rulebook (S133) is currently being revised. It will be released in mid-October. This will not affect any deadlines within the 4-H Horse project. Supplemental educational materials will also be released throughout the year to assist 4-H members, leaders and Extension staff with the 4-H Horse program.



Kansas Youth Leadership Forum

The Kansas Youth Leadership Forum will be November 23-24, 2024 at Rock Springs 4-H Center. The Forum is for youth ages 14-18, as of January 1, 2024. Registrations will be due Monday, October 15, 2024. This event will include: speakers, workshops, consulting groups and election of the State 4-H Council and is a great opportunity for youth to build their leadership skills! Any Kansas 4-H member between the ages of 14-18 by January 1, 2024 may apply to be a council member. The duties of the Council Members include planning the next Youth Leadership Forum and other events, and may include assisting the State 4-H functions, working with 4-H public relations, and speaking at local achievement program, forums, and other workshops or conferences. Applications for the State 4-H Youth Council will be available in the registration materials on the State 4-H website at www.kansas4h.org.

4-H Council Event Scholarships



Did you know that the Butler County 4-H Council has event scholarships available to all Butler County 4-H members?!

Scholarship Requirements:

- Any current 4-H member is eligible to apply for a scholarship.
- 4-H'ers are limited to 2 event scholarships per 4-H year.
- Completed forms are to be submitted to the Butler County Extension Office with event payment prior to event registration deadline.





Scholarship Details:

- If you did not submit a KAP and pin application or did not receive a pin within the past year for a \$100 scholarship
- Submitted a KAP and received a pin within the past year for a \$200 scholarship. Those that have already received their 10-year pin are exempt from pin requirement.

Kansas 4-H gears up for weekend of community service Oct. 12-13

'48 Hours of 4-H' caps National 4-H Week in the U.S.

Kansas 4-H will celebrate its long-standing commitment to community service when members across the state participate in 48 Hours of 4-H, Oct. 12-13.

Beth Hinshaw, a 4-H youth development specialist in the southeast region, said the 11th annual event wraps up National 4-H Week in the United States.

"In our (4-H) pledge, we say we commit our hands to larger service to my club, community and world," Hinshaw said. "48 Hours of 4-H helps fulfill the pledge that 4-H members make every time they meet together."

48 Hours of 4-H is a project that encourages clubs in the state to plan a community service project. "It's not a 48 hour project," Hinshaw said, "but rather a project that you do sometime during that 48 hour timeframe."

"We want the service to be meaningful and we want it to make a difference in their community," she added. "This gives young people an opportunity to look at what is needed in their community."

In the past, Hinshaw said groups have been very creative in how they have chosen to help their community, including such things as:

- Planting flowers and bulbs, and cleaning up community gardens and parks for community beautification.
- Collecting non-perishable food, hygiene items and pet supplies for local agencies.
- Partnering with community events.
- Showing appreciation to local law enforcement, fire department and 9/11 heroes.

"They've found something to do that will make a difference in the community where they live," Hinshaw said. "Some groups have long-time partners that they work with, and others try new projects. One local unit is making harvest snacks for elevators to show appreciation to farmers, and another is re-painting the trash cans at the fairgrounds with 4-H themes."

Hinshaw added that the Rock Springs Ranch near Junction City will host a statewide 48 Hours of 4-H project in conjunction with the Live Well, Lead Well health workshop on Saturday, Oct. 12.

The service project will be from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m., followed by lunch and scheduled workshop. Registration is available online at www.kansas4h.org and must be received by Oct. 8.

In addition to asking local media to cover their project, Hinshaw urges Kansas 4-H clubs to post pictures to Instagram, Facebook and Twitter with the hashtag, #484H.

More information about 48 Hours of 4-H and how to register a project is available online.

Hinshaw also said that the new 4-H year begins Oct. 1, noting that 48 Hours of 4-H is often an opportunity for those considering membership to see what 4-H is all about. More information about 4-H, including how to get involved, is available online, and from local extension offices in Kansas.
